

- **CCEM** has been supporting workers in a severe labour exploitation case in the French champagne industry. Around 50 - mostly undocumented - seasonal workers from Africa (Mauritania, Ivory Coast and Senegal) were severely exploited and housed in appalling conditions during the 2023 harvest. On 21 July, the employer and two others were charged guilty of human trafficking and sentenced to 1-2 years' imprisonment and paying 4,000 euros to each victim. See more.



Europol Cross-Country Operation

Europol reported a major operation against human trafficking across 44 countries resulting in safeguarding 1.194 potential victims and 158 arrests. Authorities, led by Austria and Romania, focused on human trafficking for the purpose of sexual exploitation, forced criminality, and forced begging.

Politico reported that right-wing groups across Europe express growing concern that NGOs are using EU grant money to lobby for stringent regulations in areas such as the environment and health. As a result, they successfully voted to establish a working group to probe EU funding of

more dangerous routes and prevent timely and accurate identification of trafficked persons. **Dutch Migration Policies: From Criminalising Solidarity to Wasting Labour Potential** Earlier this month, the Dutch Parliament has approved a series of <u>Asylum Law</u> reforms proposed by the far-right Party for Freedom (PVV), including an amendment that would criminalise providing

substantive human rights obligations to prevent and combat corruption, incentivising broad consultations, encouraging HRC mechanisms to consider corruption's impact, and stronger policy coherence across UN bodies. ECRE Calls for Gender-Sensitive Protection of Trafficked Asylum-Seeking Women and Girls ECRE's published a new Policy Note, A Gender-sensitive Approach to Combating Human Trafficking and Support Asylum-seeking Survivors in the EU, exploring how EU asylum and antitrafficking frameworks can better protect refugee women and girls who are at risk of or have experienced human trafficking. The note analyses the revised EU Anti-Trafficking Directive and its link with the proposed Facilitators Directive, stressing the need for gender-sensitive strategies. Key recommendations for EUMS include: establishing gender-sensitive national referral systems involving asylum authorities, strengthening coordination mechanisms and action plans, ensuring access to asylum and protection from unsafe transfers under the Dublin Regulation, and improving disaggregated data collection for more effective anti-trafficking efforts. **EUAA Factsheet on Human Trafficking** The EU Agency of Asylum released a fact sheet on victims of human trafficking in asylum and

Report Warns of Religious Extremism Undermining **Democracy in Europe** The Next Wave: How Religious Extremism Is Regaining Power, covering 2019-2023, reveals how a growing alliance of religious extremists, far-right populists, and oligarchic funders is reshaping European politics. The report documents a covert, strategic effort to normalise religious extremism in public life through media, NGOs, political parties, and public institutions, all under the guise of tradition and care. It highlights the creation of ideologically driven infrastructures aimed at rolling back decades of progress on sexual and reproductive rights. CoE's Recommendations Strengthen Child **Protections**

The Council of Europe's Steering Committee on the Rights of the Child published two new Recommendations and an Implementation Tool aimed at strengthening the protection of the rights and best interests of the child in <u>parental separation proceedings</u> and in <u>care proceedings</u>. These tools reinforce the child's right to be heard, supported, and actively involved in decisions affecting them. They also address the systemic disadvantages impacting children in poverty, racialised groups, LGBTQI+ communities, and those affected by gender-based violence or disabilities.

British migrant rights advocate Andy Hall, known for his work exposing forced labour and human trafficking, was recently sentenced in absentia to 1 month in prison and fined in Qatar. The conviction - related to defamation and cybercrime - stemmed from allegations he forwarded email complaints about labour abuses during the 2022 FIFA World Cup. Hall is now raising €10,000 to appeal the conviction in Qatar.

TO FORCED MARRIAGE

AMRASSADE Member States (EUMS) now have until July 2026 to qualify the exploitation of forced marriage as human trafficking, if all the criteria constituting the offence of human trafficking are fulfilled. Moreover, the new 2024 Directive on Violence against Women/Domestic Violence requires EUMS to criminalise force marriage. Forced marriage is not a tradition - it is violence. It denies people,

Directive On 14 July, the first year of the transposing period of the revised EU Anti-Trafficking Directive passed. EUMS have until 15 July 2026 to transpose the amended Directive. LSI and its members are closely following the process, in particular developments around strengthening NRMs, or establishing national focal points, next to following the required legislative changes. **Concern Over EU Omnibus Proposals** Following the EU Council's earlier decision on the so-called Omnibus package - weakening key

- **EU Shifts Towards Restrictive Migration Policies** The political climate in Europe has been changing, and the EU's priorities are following suit. The European Commission's new long-term budget proposal calls for €74 billion for "migration borders" security," at least €130 billion of military spending, and a €190 billion "external action" fund, in part to push EU internal security and migration priorities abroad. Moreover, following the Parliament's approval, the EU Council gave green light to start the EU Entry/Exit system, providing law enforcement bodies access to data enabling them to verify the third-country nationals' identity. - **UK-France Migration Deal Intensifies Pressure on EU Asylum Policy** A <u>newly agreed UK–France migration pact</u> institutes a "one in, one out" pilot. The UK will return up to 50 unauthorised Channel crossings per week to France and admit an equal number of

asylum-seekers with legitimate ties to the UK. France is also granted expanded powers to intercept small boats, raising serious humanitarian concerns over safety and legality. The deal bypasses EU-wide frameworks and will require EU approval. On top of risking undermining EU's legal coherence, rather than addressing root causes, the deal could force asylum-seekers into



ITUC Urges Global Plan to Rescue SDGs As preparations begin for the 2025 UN High-Level Political Forum on Sustainable Development, the International Trade Union Confederation (ITUC) is calling for urgent action to get the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) back on track. Trade unions are calling for a bold global agenda that ensures decent work, universal social protection, just transitions, and the protection of democratic rights.
